# **Chesaning Lions Club Celebrates 50 Years!**

Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service club with over 46,000 clubs and 1.4 million members worldwide! They are known for their work in preventing blindness, a mission that was begun when Helen Keller attended the Lions Clubs International Convention in 1925 "and challenged Lions to become knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness". The Chesaning Lions Club was originally chartered by the St. Charles group in 1967 and included many teachers and businessmen. You may remember Ward Anderson, who passed away in 2014, was a founding member of the Chesaning group.

The missions of the Lions Club are many and they tirelessly work to make their communities better. All money raised by the Lions Clubs must go back into their communities and the Chesaning Club works hard to support leader dogs for the blind (Paws With A Cause), eye glasses and hearing aides for those who can't afford them, accessibility ramps for the handicap, and Bear Lake Camp in Lapeer for children with special needs and visual impairments.

The Chesaning Lions Club fundraises through mint and white cane sales, but their biggest fundraiser is their concession trailer

that can be seen at many local events, including the Saginaw County Fair, MMOGTA Tractor Show and, most recently, the Chesaning Cross Country Invitational. They also support 2 miles of road clean-up on M-52 between Peet and Baldwin Roads, and they offer rental of their Hall on Corunna Road. This busy group of 22 members also hosts an Easter Egg Hunt in the spring and supports the Chesaning Christmas Candlelight Walk with volunteer hours and donations.

Each participant will receive a manual and a certificate at the end of the program.







# **Back To School, Then and Now**

It's that time again, alarms going off early, breakfast made, lunches packed and buses boarded. September is always a remembrance of back to school. Just think back when there was a time that there was no school. It was 174 years ago when the settlement of North Hampton decided it was a clever idea to have a school. In 1843 a small shanty was erected on the east side of the river to serve as a schoolhouse. The first teacher was Eliza Ann Smith, who taught 11 pupils. One afternoon a heavy rain started to come down. It was near the end of the day, so the teacher and pupils decided to wait for the rain to cease before they left the school. It kept pouring until finally the rain came into the schoolhouse and left no dry places inside. They finally grabbed their belongings and fled the school for a nearby neighbor.

The next school was built on the west side of the river, but not until 1845. It was also a temporary arrangement. Later in the year the school district was formed and then a regular school was built on the east side of the river at the top of the hill. The school

opened at the beginning of the year in 1846 with Miss Sarah Lambright as the teacher.

Throughout the



years the school had changed locations and teachers. In 1869 when Chesaning became an incorporated village, a brick school house was built and furnished for the cost of \$14,000. The new school opened around the first of December with three departments, primary, intermediate and grammar. On February 19th, 1870, it became a union school by a special act of legislature.

The first class to graduate was in 1883 with nine students. The school had changed over the years adding Latin, German, drawing, music and, arithmetic. It also changed in size to accommodate the growth of the village to meet all of the students' needs. It appears that school today is not any different from schools of the past; always changing to better our students, community and future.
